#### **Artist Statement**

Graham Fracha creates energetic paintings centered on themes of land, human presence and boundaries. For Fracha's first exhibition at Gallery IMA he has chosen current work from his "Dwellings" series, which continues his exploration of landscapes the use of homestead-type structures as an indication of human presence. In this new series, Fracha has chosen images of fences to pose the question, "How do we divide the land and mark it as our own?"

Assembled or dismantled, the fences tumble into view, rather than pose a static boundary. The fences head to the open terrain or they depart from it with force and a sense of purpose. Mixed media, such as aluminum or copper, have been incorporated in a multi-layered design, creating a fortified barrier. The fences attempt to surround what has become private, while the metal protects what is valued. Flat strokes of color overlap each other and the dwellings underneath and the land begins to come into focus as it attempts to erase the structures.

Graham Fracha was born in Annapolis, MD, in 1974, raised in Tucson, AZ, and came to Seattle, WA to attend Cornish College of the Arts in 1992. Currently, he lives and works in Edmonds, WA. He has exhibited in England, France, New York and throughout the West Coast. His paintings are in the collection of Swedish Hospital, the City of Kent and numerous private collections around the country.
